Doctorate in Anthropology

The doctorate in Anthropology (Ph.D. in Anthropology) is a program targeting the development of independent research, specializing in investigating socio- cultural phenomena and its problems. The program will have a strong emphasis on anthropological theory and methodology and its graduates will be well placed to contribute to the advancement of the field. They will be able to contribute as academics and researchers in higher education and to take up research positions, among others. The program is composed of excellent faculty, with expertise in anthropology and related social sciences.

This program is supported by an Institutional Development Grant from the Wenner-Gren Foundation and works in collaboration with anthropology departments at three partner institutions: University College London, Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú and Stanford University.

Areas of investigation

Environment, development and sustainability

This line articulates an interest in the ways in which humans relate to their environment and its non-human agents, as they mutually constitute each other. It encompasses a comparative consideration of the heterogeneous ways of conceiving human ecology and life in general. The line inquires, among other themes, into environmental conflict, development and sustainability, dynamics of extractivism, climate change, conservation and habitability in the Anthropocene.

Governance and diversity

This line develops interests in the problematization of different social processes related to governance, political activism, and resistance, with particular attention to the emergence of economic, political, ethnic, racial, and gender diversity. More specifically, this line articulates research around the political dimensions of life, essential for the understanding of contemporary society, and includes topics such as structural violence, migration, social movements, democracy and citizenship, transitional justice, among others.

Kinship, religion and everyday life

This line articulates questions on everyday life that are essential for an understanding of contemporary society, namely from the point of view of intimate relations, domesticity, family, and the religious imagination. More specifically, the line places a diversity of themes at the forefront, such as consumption, kinship, religion, the experience and concept of body, and material culture, among others.
