The doctorate in Anthropology (PhD in Anthropology) is a program targeting the development of independent research, specializing in investigating sociocultural phenomena and problems. Its graduates will contribute to the advancement of knowledge in the field, with a strong background in theories and anthropological methodologies. They will be able to contribute as academics and researchers in higher education and research positions, among others. The program is composed of excellent faculty, with expertise in anthropology and related social sciences.

This program was supported by an Institutional Development Grant from the Wenner-Gren Foundation and works in collaboration with anthropology deparments at three partner institutions: University College London, Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú and Stanford University.

Areas of Investigation

Environment, development and sustainability

This line articulates interests in the various ways in which the human being relates to its environment, and the particular ways in which human beings and Environments are mutually constituted through these relationships. Likewise, encompasses the consideration of the divergences and convergences that arise between various ways of conceiving these processes, and life in general. This axis articulates lines of research related to conflict environmental, development and sustainability questions, and dynamics of extractivism and conversation.

Governance and diversity

In this line interests converge for the problematization of different social processes related to governance, political activism, and resistance with particular attention to the emergence of economic, political, ethnic, racial and gender diversity. More specifically, this axis articulates lines of research around the general political dimensions of life, which appear essential for understanding contemporary society. These include: structural violence; migration; social movements; democracy and citizenship; transitional justice, among others.

Kinship, religion and everyday life

This line articulates a transversal interest in problematizing the main characteristics of daily life based on social relations observed in the intimate sphere, such as kinship and religiosity. More specifically, this axis articulates lines of research around the general dimensions of everyday life, which appear essential for understanding contemporary society. These include: consumption; relationship; religion; Body care; material culture, among others..
